E be e le mosetsana a nnoši. O be a na le dikgaetšedi tše tshela.

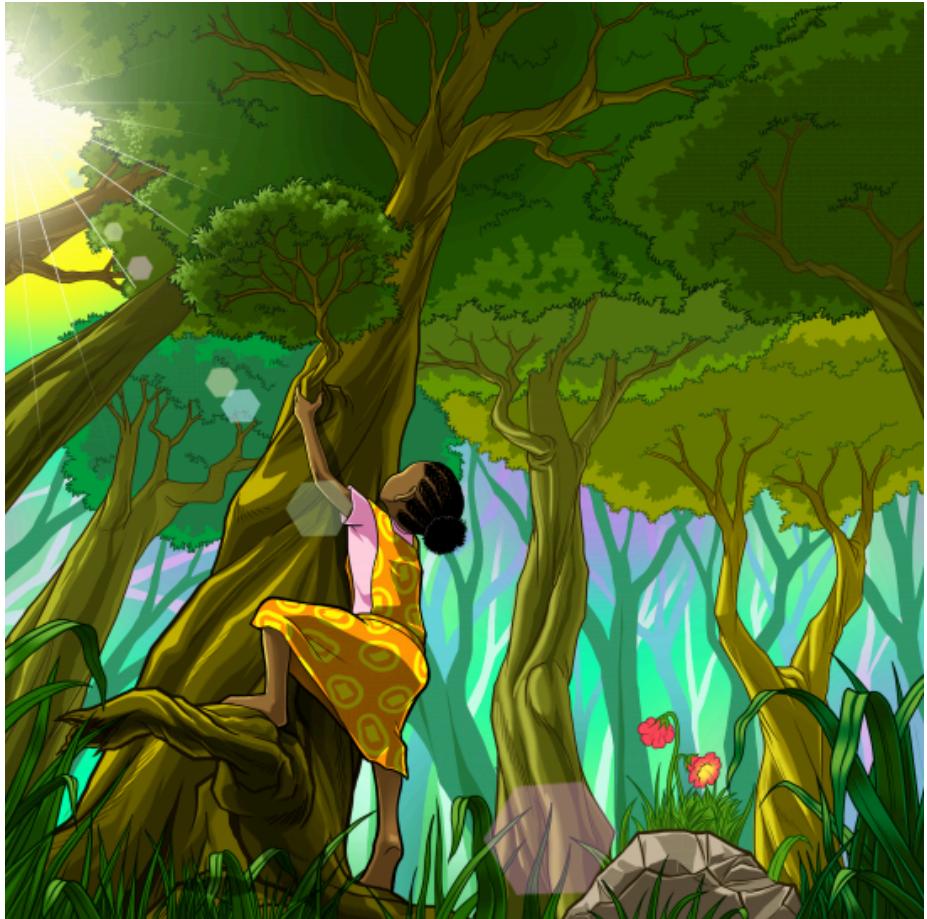
Batswadi ba Khathaza ba be ba mo lemile.

A namela mohlare wo motelele.



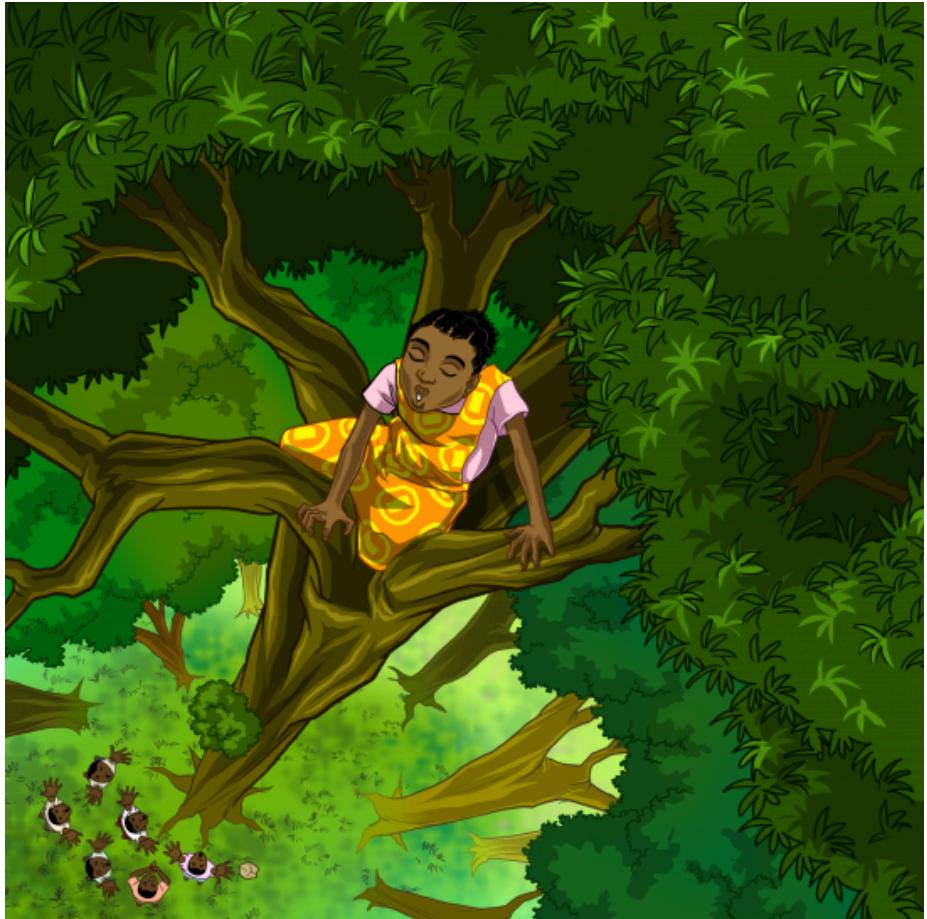

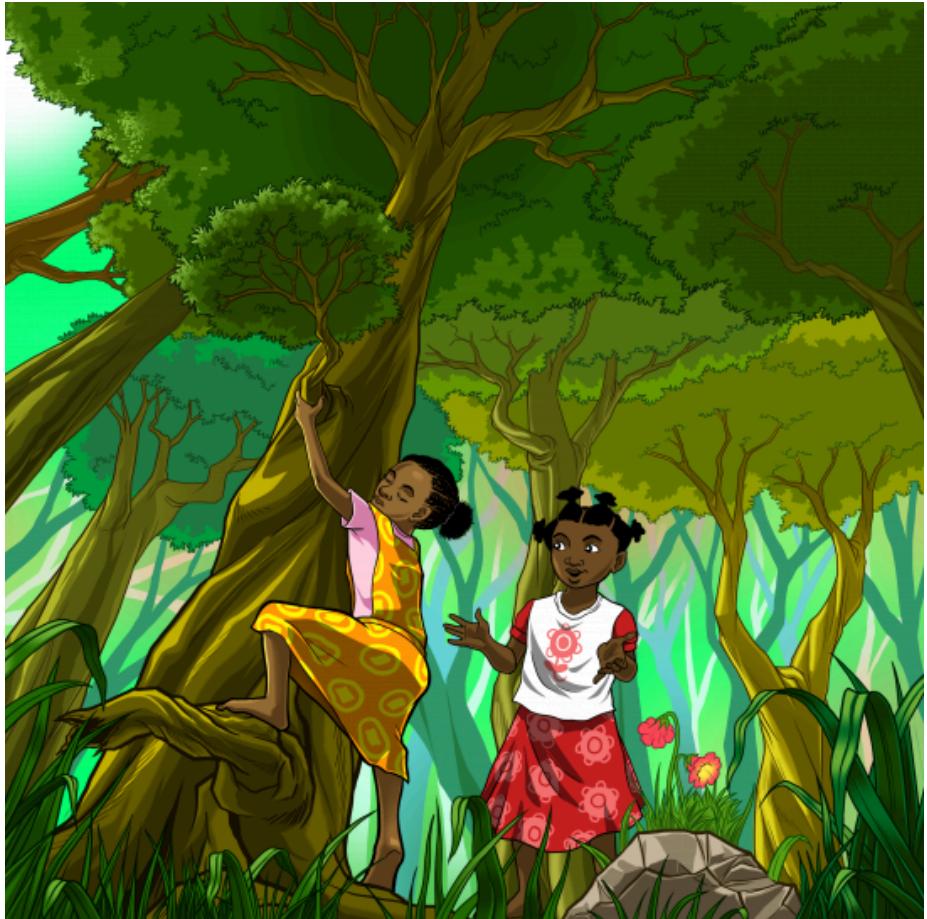
