



‘Can I play with them?’


‘Yes Thembsie!’

And Thembsie twists and shapes the balloons that way.




‘Papa, can you make this balloon into a sausage dog?’

‘Yes, Thembsie.’




Papa and Thembsie go inside.





Papa twists and shapes the balloon this way.



And Papa twists and shapes the balloon that way.




Thembsie and her sausage dog
