


## Village lockdown

"What did you do to keep safe from the virus?" asks Langa.




"Wake up in the morning and wash our hands. Wash our hands again before we eat," replies Mandla.

"You must cover your nose and mouth with a mask. When you cough, you must cover your mouth inside your elbow. After you cough you must wash your hands," sighs Langa.




"Where I stay, we're no longer able to play soccer," says Mandla.

"Where I stay, the old people are no longer able to get their treatment from the clinic," says Langa.




"The lockdown has badly affected people who live in a village," says Langa.
