



Naka na Nala va vulavula hi moya

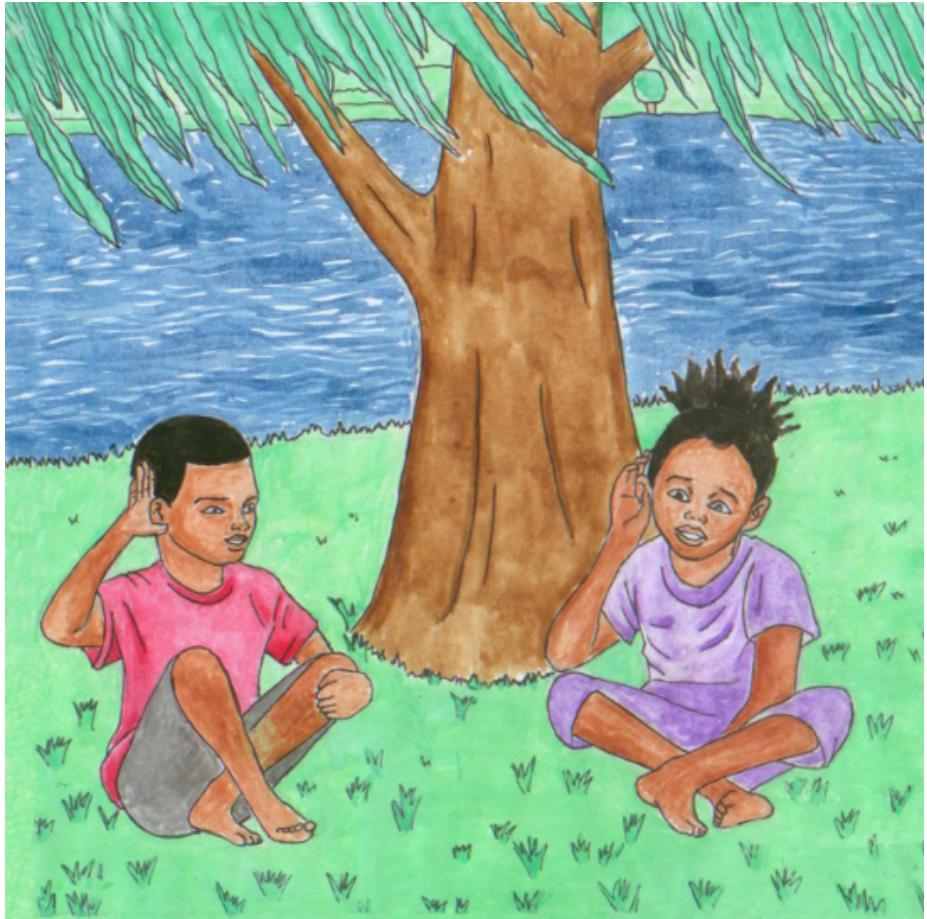
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Naka na Nala va le nhoveni leyi omeke,
