

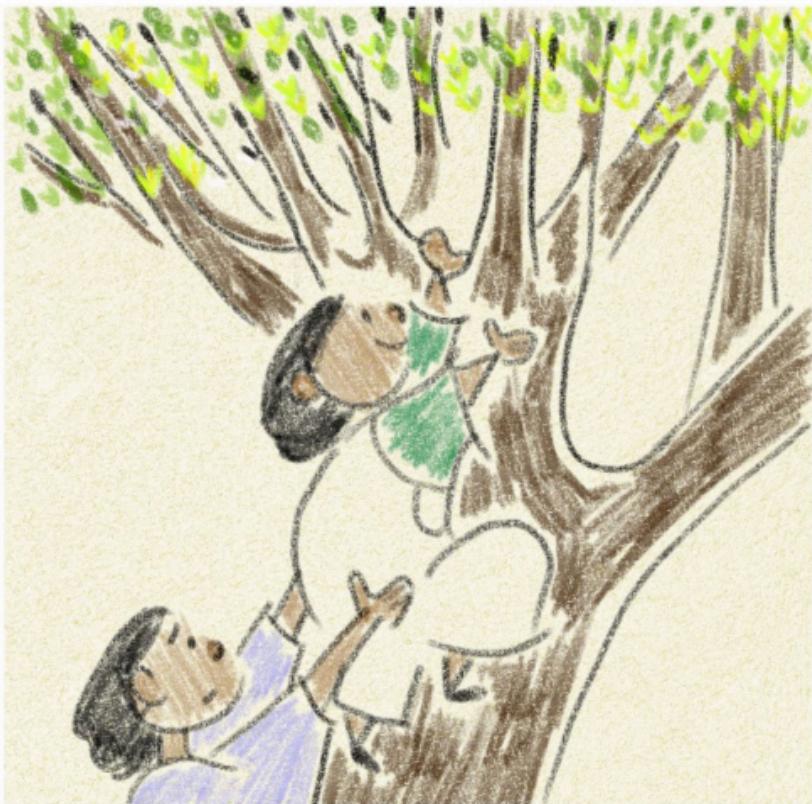


Kanegelo ya Lesedi
