She had six brothers.

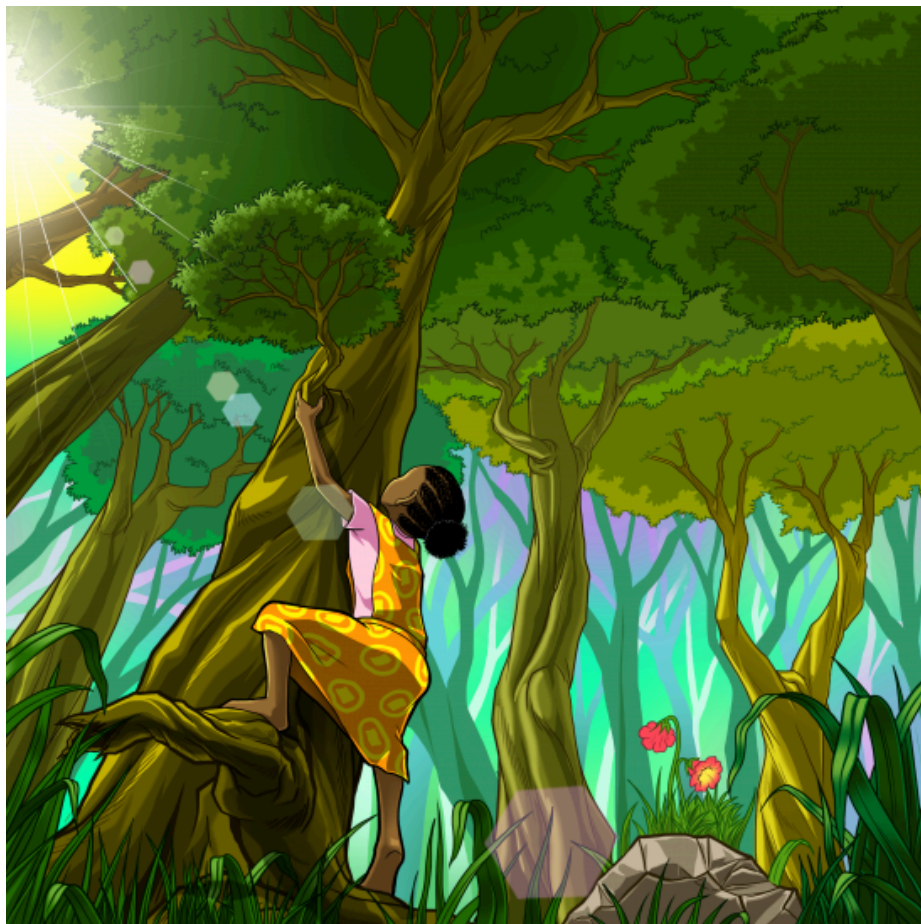
Khathaza's parents spoiled her.

One of them played her favourite song, and the others sang.



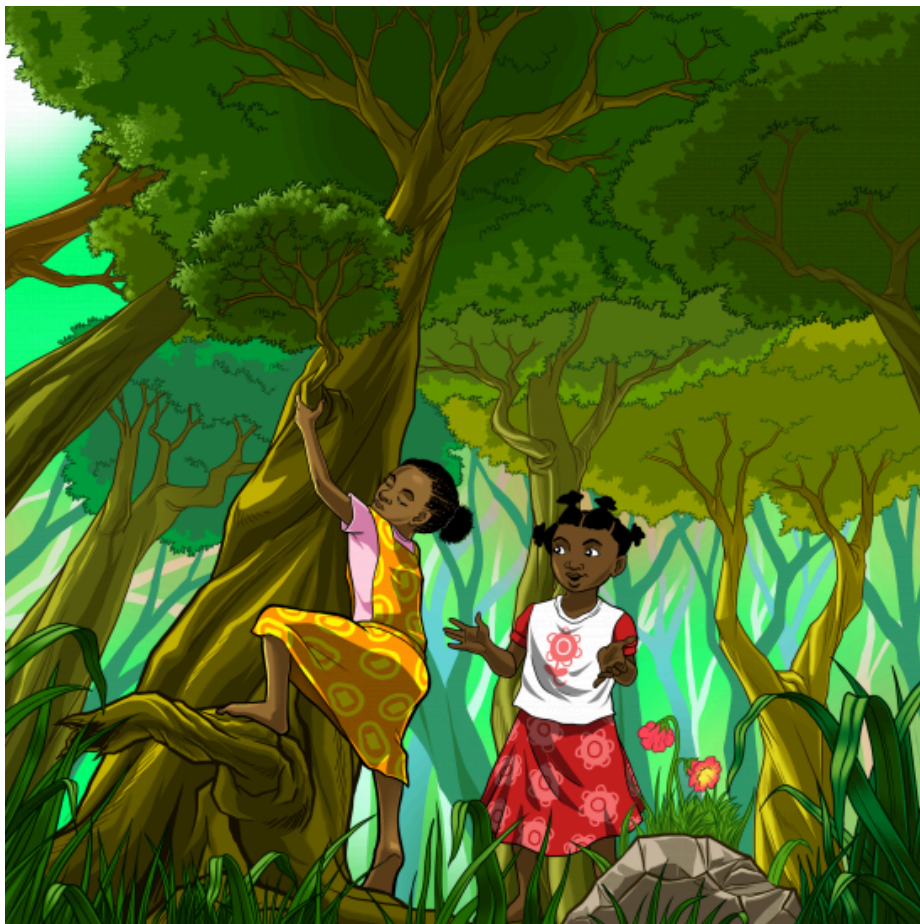
Khathaza's anger got better and better.
