Ba tsošitšwe ke medumo e šele lefasetereng!

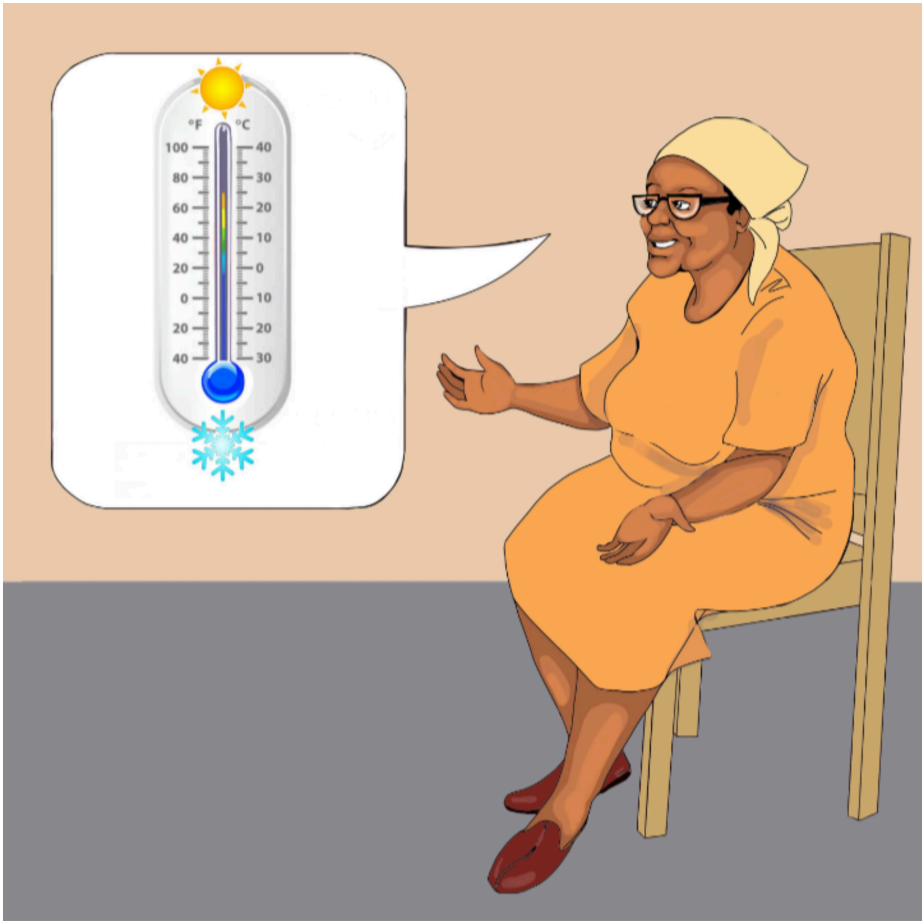


“Thobela, makgolo,” gwa realo basetsana. “Na ke modumo wa eng?”
