*When reading at home:*

**Make reading part of your daily routine.**

**Discuss what you think might  
happen in the story.**

**Use the pictures to tell the story.**

**Mimic sounds and actions from  
the story.**

**Use your face  
and voice to  
demonstrate  
different  
emotions from  
the story.**

**Involve  
different  
senses, like  
touch and  
hearing.**





*When reading at home:*

**Involve different senses, like sight.**





*When reading at home:*

**Use descriptive  
words and  
explanations.**





*When reading at home:*

**Discuss  
new words  
and  
concepts.**





*When reading at home:*

**Ask family members for help.**

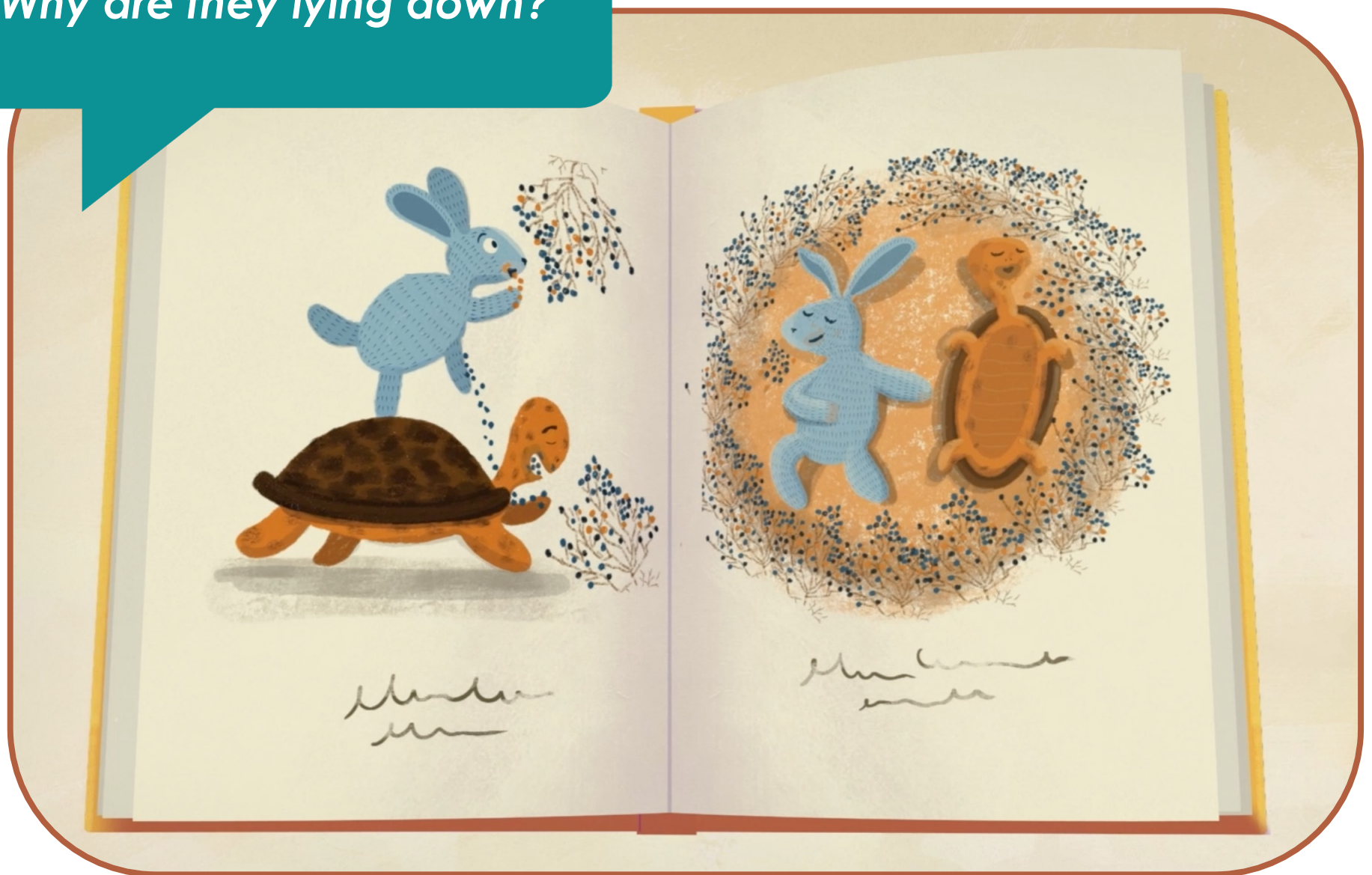




*When reading at home:*

**Ask “Who, What, Where, Why  
and How” questions.**

*Who is eating?  
What are they eating?  
Where is rabbit standing?  
Why are they lying down?*





*When reading at home:*

**Let older  
children read  
aloud and ask  
them questions.**





*When reading at home:*

**Pause to check for understanding.**





*When reading at home:*

**For children who struggle to speak, use drawings or pictures to communicate.**







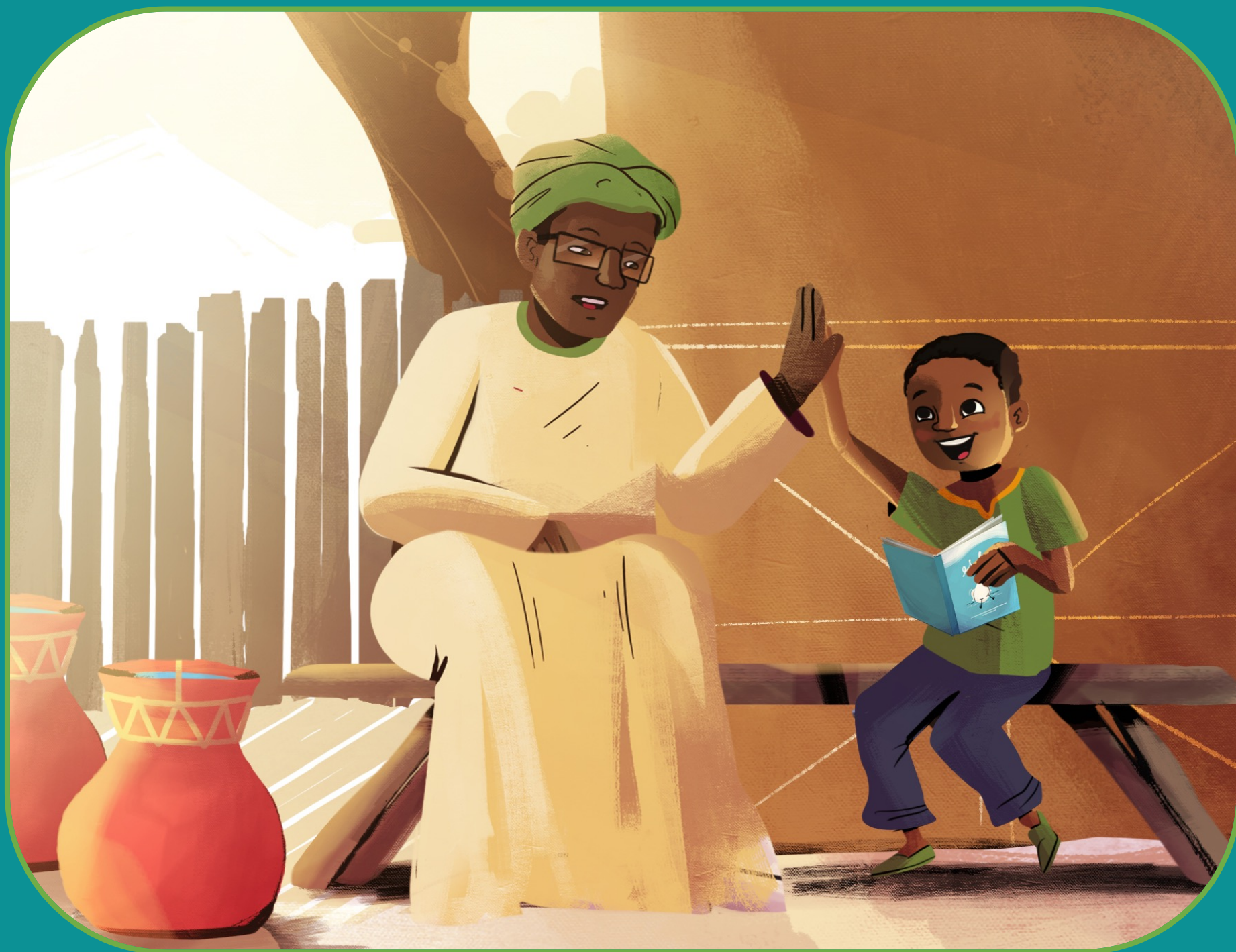
*When reading at home:*

**Look for words  
that start with the  
same sound or  
find words that  
rhyme.**

**Draw key events or write sentences from the story.**

**Make up songs about the story or new words.**
